Key Activities

11,597 members in 522 community groups and main committees facilitated by Sahakarmi Samaj have collected 118.7 million rupees (USD 892,000; Euro 824,000) through regular and seasonal savings. 68% of these savings have been invested in income generation and 30% in household work. The remaining 2% is in cash or bank balance. This has led to financial independence among the marginalized communities resulting in their freedom from high interest rate charged by private money lenders. The members of community have contributed and participated in the economic and social transformation of the society. This is a great example of how the people of the community can create and mobilize a large amount of resources themselves.

Access to Government Service Facilities



Facilitating group discussions, lobbying and mentoring through the local employees resulted in participation of 83,189 members in the local level planning process. A total of 4,306 proposals were submitted by the 1245 groups to the municipalities through the ward committee to address the issues of the communities. This year, 81 new community groups have been officially registered in the municipalities and 66 have been renewed. The representatives of the municipalities participated in 65 programs conducted by the community groups. 11 interactions on government service facility and quality measurement were held along with and 27 village (tole) level plan selection process facilitation. Through these activities, mutual accountability has been strengthened between the duty bearers and the right holders.

Community Governance and Capacity Building

Sahakarmi Samaj holds the belief that the long-term transformation of the marginalized communities is possible only if they can prepare the framework of their own change. Emphasis is placed on the institutional development of local community organizations to institutionalize the process of communities taking leadership and ownership of change in a sustainable manner and to enable local organizations to transform their communities. In order for the organized power of local citizens to move forward in accordance with the FEST process for social transformation, Sahakarmi Samaj is continuously advancing the process of cooperation, support and partnership in a planned manner. After the empowerment of community groups in marginalized communities, a strategy has been taken to move community groups forward in an organized and sustainable manner by building community-based network organizations (CBNOs) and developing the capacity of such organizations. Sahakarmi Samaj is supporting the institutional development of 20 CBNOs in Banke, Bardia, Surkhet, Kailali, Kanchanpur, Dang and Jajarkot by providing various types of training, facilitating interactions and consulting for sustainable development. The CBNOs are continuously striving for the empowerment of the local community and for ensuring sustainable livelihoods by identifying, protecting and using local resources and continuing their efforts to find solutions to local problems. This process is an important contribution to achieving the goal of improving the wellbeing for the people of marginalized communities through their institutional development.

Problem Analysis, Action Planning and Implementation Evaluation

This year, 6,465 community plans were implemented through the analysis of 4,203 community problems identified with the help of FEST's CODE facilitation in 706 groups including community groups, village development organizations, and women's groups. A total of 5,087 plans were executed with the use of local knowledge and skill resources. 4,720 action plans were reviewed and reflected.

Livelihood Improvement& Entrepreneurial Development

Construction and Maintenance of Community Facilities

Community groups have completed various community development projects using local skills, knowledge, resources and experience. As a result, they have been able to overcome some of the problems they face in their daily lives. The people of the communities in collaboration with the local

government, and other stakeholders, have constructed: culverts at 80 locations; water irrigation canals at 111 locations; roads at 332 locations, including maintenance, cleaning and grading (348.25 km); 16 embankments along rivers; 50 group buildings; construction and maintenance of 10 irrigation ponds; installation of 14 hump pipes; digging of 29 drinking water wells; construction of retaining walls at 150 locations to prevent landslides; construction of ramps at 45 places to cross rivers; construction of 46 quadrilaterals; and construction of 25 dykes


Community Health, Sanitation and Drinking Water



Members of community groups, in cooperation with the support and facilitation of Sahakarmi Samaj, have made significant contributions in community health, sanitation and drinking water, which has improved the health of people and increased access to drinking water, health and sanitation. With community resources, and the support of local government: 7,826 houses and roads were cleaned; hand washing managementsystems were built in 4,718 houses; 594 water sources were cleaned; 2,795 sheds were built, repaired and cleaned; 21,565 drying racks; and 3,000 meters of drain construction and cleaning have been completed. 1,093 people received health checks in health camps; 528 visits and counseling for malnourished people were conducted; 989 children with their parents received information about measles vaccination services; 3,64 people built and used garbage disposal pits; 153 women got pregnancy checkups, 90,074 people purchased and used water filters; 20 blocks were constructed and cleaned; 296 women used sanitary pads regularly; 90 groups participated in health and sanitation related interactions; and sample eco septic tanks were installed.

Ensuring Quality Educational

Environment/Climate Adaptation & DRR Efforts

Sahakarmi Samaj's overarching objective is to build resilient communities, including integratingactivites for forest protection and climate adaptation in project programs. In this financial year, within the work area of the Sahakarmi Samaj, disaster reduction and disaster management discussions were held 141 times. A total of 9,804 trees were planted, and 25 drains and culverts were constructed to manage water run-off and flooding. Discussions on embankments in rivers and streams in disaster-prone areas took place, and 35 houses and 8 temporary shelters were built. An emergency relief fund was established by 29 groups, totaling Rs. 83,500. Additionally, fire lines were made in 11 forests; 29 plastic tunnels were set up; earthing was implemented in the electrical wiring of 4 houses; 15 grazing areas were protected; and 5 forests established systems to manageanimal control. These community activities were carried out to mitigate potential disaster risks. Over the past year, significant progress has been made in these areas through various community-driven initiatives:

1. Community Involvement in Forest Management:

- Election to Forest Committees: 282 group members were elected to community-level forest committees.
- Forest Clearings and Public Hearings: 121 forest clearings were conducted, and 17 requests for public hearings on forest management were submitted in ward meetings.

2. Tree Planting and Grass Cultivation:

- Seedling Planting: 28,558 seedlings of various types were planted to enhance forest cover.
- Grass Cultivation: 961 households engaged in grass cultivation to support livestock and prevent soil erosion.

3. Renewable Energy and Sustainable Practices:

- Bio Gas Connections: 82 households installed bio-gas connections, promoting clean energy use.
- ts: 654 animal sheds were improved or repaired, enhancing livestock welfare and productivity.



4. Income Generation:

• Dunatpari Production: 25 individuals generated income through dunatpari (local handicrafts: plates made of leaves).

5. Organic Farming and Waste Management:

- Organic Practices: 1,325 households adopted the production and use of bag manure and organic pesticides, promoting sustainable agriculture.
- Garbage Pits: 466 households constructed and used garbage pits for better waste management.
- Irrigation Ponds: 32 households constructed and used irrigation ponds to manage water resources efficiently.

6. Forest Maintenance and Monitoring:

• Community forests were maintained and the community members conducted 14 monitoring visit, ensuring ongoing protection and sustainability.

These activities have significantly contributed to climate adaptation and environmental protection, fostering resilient communities that are better equipped to face climate challenges

Reconciliation, Peace and Reunification

Sahakarmi Samaj is a process-oriented social organization with a significant influence in various fields. It has been actively facilitating and supporting initiatives in areas such as reconciliation, peace, and reunification. It has made substantial contributions to fostering mutual relations, respect, and maintaining social harmony within the community.

This year, Community Based Network Organizations, community groups and local stakeholdersin cooperation with Sahakarmi have achieved notable milestones, including:

- Reconciliation of 150 group members through mediation.
- Coaching 34 individuals to resolve land and boundary disputes.
- Addressing family discord in 384 families.
- Organizing collective celebrations of the traditional festivals of Maghi and DeusiBhailo with 45 groups.
- Supporting 29 groups in collective farming.
- Settling conflicts between mothers-in-law and daughters-in-law in 36 households.
- Conducting discussions on caste discrimination in 19 groups.
- Forming civil networks for justice in 6 communities.

Through these efforts, Sahakarmi Samaj continues to play a vital role in promoting peace and social cohesion in the community.

Enhanced Interface and Coordination with Local Government

There have been increased and enhanced local community interfaces and coordination with the local government. These interfaces and coordination have resulted in local government providing the members of communities with opportunities for capacity building trainings, and participation in workshops and seminars. And this has led to more active and enthusiastic participation by local communities in the programs organized by local government: Women's Day and Teej programs. These efforts have significantly increased awareness and capacity development among the community.

Highlights of participation include:

- Maghi Festival: 88 people participated in the festival organized by the municipality and received awards.
- Women's Day: 275 people received awards for their excellent contributions in jointly organizing Women's Day.
- Empowerment Training: 1,509 people participated in empowerment training sessions.
- Animal Husbandry Training: 297 people took part in animal husbandry training.
- Leadership Training: 256 people participated in people's leadership training.
- Sanitation Training: 164 people attended sanitation training.
- Local Government Training and Interactions: community members participated in 24 training and interaction sessions organized by the local governments.

Participation in the Government's Local Planning Process

Regular facilitation, coaching, and mentoring by Sahakarmi Samaj led to the active participation of 20,941 people, 13,564 women and 7,549 men, in the local planning process of the local governments. These participants engaged in addressing community-level issues, lobbying, and advocating for solutions. As a result, commitments have been received from the concerned local government to address some of these issues. Additionally, 247 people with disabilities and 1,676 youth also took part in this process.

Sahakarmi Samaj is a Gender Equality, Disability, and Social Inclusion (GEDSI) friendly organization, and its programs are also being made GEDSI friendly. As part of its efforts, Sahakarmi Samaj conducted 502 interactions related to gender equality, disability and social inclusion across various projects in Nepal. Additionally, the organization hosted Teej Milan (women's) programs in 21 locations and Women's Day programs in 5 locations. Moreover, 54 women served as representatives in consumer committees, and 60 women took leadership roles in various groups

Food and Nutrition

This year, significant strides have been made at the community level to improve food sufficiency and nutrition. A total of 3,351 households have contributed to planting 24,420 fruit plants, while 381 nutrition awareness sessions have been conducted. Additionally, 1,150 households have engaged in planting 10,709 herbal plants. Moreover, there has been a notable improvement in the adoption of bbalanced dietary practices within 3,498 households. Furthermore, 2,952 households have reported an increase in food crop production, while 146 households have successfully reduced junk food consumption.

Lastly, 9 households have initiated farming on previously barren land, contributing to sustainable agricultural practices. These collective efforts underscore a commitment to enhancing food security and nutrition within the community.

CSO Strengthening and Capacity building



Sahakarmi Samaj exit policy consists of organizational strengthening of the CBNOs that runs directly in the initial years and then remote mentoring in the latter years. Sahakarmi Samaj conducts various trainings and capacity building workshops to different organization and civil societies: I/NGOs, CSos, CBNOs, and government agencies. Likewise, it also conducts training workshops and strategic planning for their project employees to enhance staff's capacity. This year, Sahakarmi conducted 25 internal trainings and workshops where 524 participants horned their skills and experience. Likewise, 16 capacity building trainings were completed for the capacity development of employees and representatives of other external organizations and their partner organizations, in which 377 participants took part.

Messages from Representatives of Local Government

Social Awakening for Transformation – Municipality Chair in Dang District

It has guided individuals in understanding and addressing their rights, pains, sorrows, and social issues. The organization's people-oriented approach organizes individuals into groups, fostering sustainable and effective village development. The groups affiliated with the social development network have been diligent in saving regularly and utilizing these savings for income-generating activities. Consequently, people from impoverished families in this area have improved their livelihoods through these savings initiatives. Sahakarmi Samaj Nepal has created an enabling environment for addressing health and sanitation, drinking water, nutrition, capacity development, climate adaptation, and the preservation of indigenous culture. It operates through continuous consultation, coordination, and cooperation with the local government. This year, a tripartite partnership between Banglachuli Rural Municipality, Sahakarmi Sama, and Samaj Bikas Sanjal has been established to manage a fund program for safe water.

On behalf of Banglachuli Rural Municipality, I extend my heartfelt wishes for the continued success of Sahakarmi Samaj Nepal in achieving its mission of social transformation.



पालिकाभरिका ६० टोल समितिमा ६ हजारको संख्यामा सदस्य आबद्ध छन्। टोल समिति कम्तीमा ६० जना सदस्य संख्याका छन्। टोलमा एक घर एक सदस्य को अवधारणा छ। त्यसमा पनि महिलालाई प्रार्थामकतामा राष्ट्रो गरिएको सहकर्मी समाज कार्यक्रमका प्रमुख डम्मर भण्डारीले वताए। सामाजिक सदुभाव र विकासमा सहकार्य जोड्न नगरपालिकाले थालेको सहकर्मी समाज अभियानले नै राजनीतिक आस्था, सिद्धान्त र विचारमाथि उदेर विकासमा सहकार्य र श्रमदानको अवधारणा विकास मएको वताउँछन् भण्डारी। पालिकामा यो अवधारणा सञ्चालन गरिएको वर्ष विन पन लागेको छ।
